

Faith and Beliefs of "Nonbelievers": Diversity of Contexts and Approaches

The contemporary religious scene changes abruptly. While, in the past, religion has always been an important source of both personal and group identity, today, in many Western countries a growing number of people quit identifying themselves with churches/faith communities, leaving the traditional religious practice and questioning the doctrines. This phenomenon has its deep cultural, political, and moral consequences not only for the church but also for the society at large. It leads, inter alia, to the attenuation of one's cultural and personal identity in the globally multicultural world. The loss of identity results with many people in the feelings of anxiety and disorientation, making them prone to different kinds of populists, including religious fundamentalists, extremists, and fanatics. Moreover, the media, religious leaders, and public figures often exacerbate the confusion by using superficial views and simplifications.

This working session will further elaborate on topics related to the research project **Faith and Beliefs of "Nonbelievers"** supported by the **John Templeton Foundation** (ID 61385; project leader: **Prof. Dr Tomáš Halík**).

- Belief and nonbelief in a global age
- Typology of "nonbelief"
- Methodological lessons for empirical research on "nonbelievers"
